TENBURY WELLS

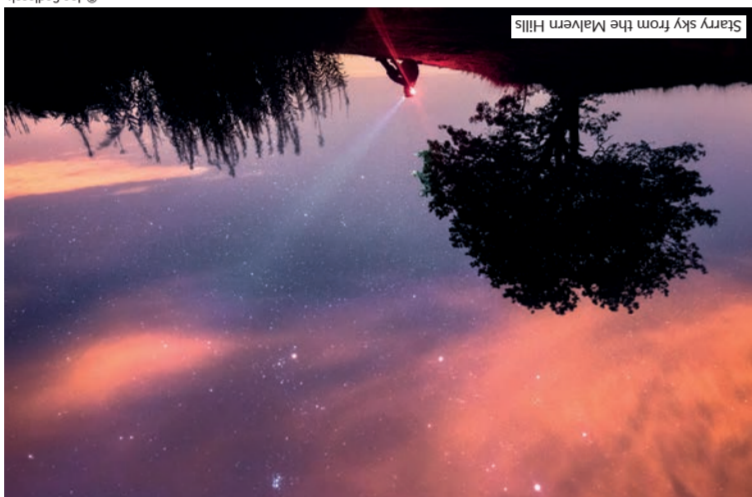

Malvern is the largest town in The Malverns and sits on the eastern slopes of the Malvern Hills taking in spectacular views across the countryside. The architecture of the town ranges from an ancient Priory and medieval gateway to magnificent Victorian hotels and shop frontages. Great Malvern is a designated conservation area for its special architectural and historic interest. Browse the fantastic independent shops and eateries in Great Malvern, Malvern Link and Barnards Green: the three centres which make up the town of Malvern.

ENJOY THE OUTDOORS

Enjoy fresh air, open spaces and big skies with The Malverns range of outdoor activities. There are fishing spots, water sports, zip wires, hot air balloon rides, golf courses and extreme sports like paragliding. Spectate at the oldest motorsport venue in the world at Sheilsley Welsh Hill Climb, hire a boat and set off down the River Severn from Upton Marina, or enjoy the thrill of the Land Rover Experience at Eastnor Castle. Find mini-golf and pick your own fruit in Upton upon Severn, vineyard tours in the Temе Valley and mountain bike hire in Great Malvern.

Malvern Theatres in Great Malvern hosts everything from Art Deco theatre the Regal in Tenbury Wells offers a variety of shows and performances as do various other venues across The Malverns like the Coach House Theatre, Malvern Cube and Emslie House. 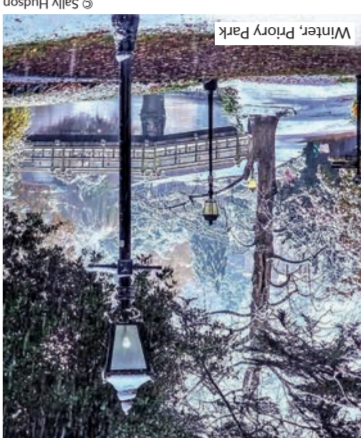
HISTORY & THINGS TO DO

England's greatest composer Sir Edward Elgar walked these paths and was inspired to write his iconic tunes such as Land of Hope & Glory here. Many a literary genius, including J.R.R Tolkien, C.S Lewis, William Langland, Charles Dickens and Charles Darwin visited The Malverns and took musing walks on the miles of footpaths that wind through some of England's most beautiful countryside.

Great Malvern, despite being founded centuries ago by Benedictine monks, flourished in the Victorian era as a healing spa retreat when people flocked to the area to take the waters. Springs are numerous across the hills, and you can still taste the famous water at Malvina Spring in Great Malvern.

In Malvern Link you can see how modern cars are made with traditional methods at the Morgan Experience Centre. Search for the beaten track The Malverns offers plenty of exploration opportunities to beautiful gardens. See our map for more information. Embark on a historic walking tour through Great Malvern with a guide from Malvern Civic Society or take the Route To The Hills self-guided trail from Great Malvern station. Learn about our varied local history at Malvern Museum, Tenbury Museum, Tudor House Museum and Upton Heritage Centre at The Peppercot.

FOOD & DRINK

The Malverns is lucky to be located within some of the greenest and most fertile land in the country, making for some incredibly short journeys from origin to table. The landscape is studded with farms and vineyards which benefit from the rich fertile soil and the sunny slopes of the Malvern Hills. Orchards and hop fields fill the countryside meaning you're never far from a pint of real ale, cider or fresh pressed apple juice. Keep a look out for brands like The Hop Shed, Malvern Hills Brewery, Oldfields and Robinsons to name just a few and many offer tours, events and tasting experiences.

Sample our amazing fresh produce at local independent restaurants, pubs and cafés, or head direct to a local farm shop or farmers' market to stock your cupboards with seasonal groceries. Local eateries take advantage of this bounty of excellent produce. Taste locally sourced dishes at Faun, Madresfield Butchers and Grill, The Cottage in the Wood and many more, with plenty of award-winning businesses to keep you fed, from farmhouse breakfasts, to the finest dining experiences.

The Malvern's most famous drink is its natural spring water, filtered through the hard rock of the Malvern Hills. Keep an eye out in local hotels, shops, cafés and restaurants for Holy Well Spring Water – sourced from the original Well – first bottled in 1622.

DID YOU KNOW? Malvern has its own pudding. Purchase the recipe from Malvern Tourist Information Centre to find out how to bake this traditional Georgian dish combining buttery cooked apples with a creamy cinnamon-flecked white sauce.

There are nearly 1,000 miles of footpaths across The Malverns, some bound over hills and others burrow through ancient woodlands. With a trail to suit every ability, some paths snake alongside hills are crossed with paths taking in hundreds of views and different perspectives on the landscape as well as important archaeological sites like British Camp Hill Fort.

Welcoming visitors and walkers since the Bronze Age, the hills are crossed with paths taking in hundreds of views and different perspectives on the landscape as well as important archaeological sites like British Camp Hill Fort. Throughout all seasons the hills treat us to something special: the summer, inversion clouds and misty mornings in the autumn woods carpeted with bluebells in the spring, endless views in and snowy peaks in the winter.

The Malvern Hills are a network of about 20 named peaks that take in views across the Severn Valley and the Cotswolds, from the rolling hills of Herefordshire to the black mountains in Wales.

Place to enjoy the glorious outdoors, but there is so much more to explore, including our historic town centres, riverside paths and woodland nature reserves.
